

## REMEMBERING MARGARET DANOWSKI

It is with a heavy heart that I convey to you that our current Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) President, colleague and friend, Margaret Danowski, passed away on Tuesday, October 25, 2022.

Margaret was the Health Professions Librarian at Central Michigan University's Park Library since 2019. Before working at Central Michigan University, she worked for 23 years as an Assistant Professor and IT/ Reference Librarian at Madonna University in Livonia, MI, where she was the Liaison to the College of Nursing and Health. In her early career, Margaret worked as a part-time librarian for a dental supply company in Romulus, MI, as well as a library technical assistant at the Oakland County Law Library.

Her early dream was to become an archaeologist. After completing her Bachelor's degree in Classical Archaeology and Cultural Anthropology (1985) at the University of Michigan, Margaret enrolled in an art history graduate program in North Carolina where she studied ancient art. She returned to Michigan and worked as a serials and routing clerk at a law library in the metropolitan Detroit area. At the urging of her supervisor, she applied to the University of Michigan's School of Library and Information Science, where she earned her M.I.L.S. in 1990.

Margaret, also called Meg, will always be remembered by her MDMLG colleagues and friends as a hard-worker with a positive disposition who was always willing to volunteer for committees and other service work. She was a member of MDMLG's Nominating Committee for two years (2020-2021 & 2021-2022), Chair of the Programming and Professional Development Committee (2021-2022), and served as President from August 2022 until her recent passing. She added a seasoned depth of insight, as well as a touch of humor, to our association discussions. She will be so missed by all of us.

At this time, there are no formal services planned. However, should any plans be announced, they will be communicated to the MDMLG membership.

## HIDDEN GEMS FROM THE NLM BOOKSHELF

The National Library of Medicine (NLM) provides numerous biomedical resources. One that may come to mind first is PubMed. A less commonly known resource is the <u>NLM Bookshelf</u>. Bookshelf provides free online access to books and documents in life science and healthcare. There are more than 9,000 titles, including classic textbooks, monographs, reference books, systematic reviews, technical reports, clinical guidelines, web materials, grey literature, and other peer-reviewed documents. There are even a few specialty drug databases: **LactMed** and **LiverTox**.



The <u>LactMed</u> database contains information on drugs and other chemicals to which breastfeeding mothers may be exposed. It includes information on the levels of such substances in breast milk and infant blood, and the possible adverse effects in the nursing infant. Suggested therapeutic alternatives to those drugs are provided, where appropriate. All data are derived from the scientific literature and fully referenced. A peer review panel reviews the data to assure scientific validity and currency.

Users are able to:

- Search by drug class or a specific drug name.
- Easily find the date a drug record was last updated.
- See suggestions for alternative drugs.



<u>LiverTox</u> provides easily accessed information on the diagnosis, cause, frequency, clinical patterns, and management of liver injury attributable to prescription and nonprescription medications and selected herbal and dietary supplements. The LiverTox site is meant as a resource for both physicians and patients as well as for clinical academicians and researchers who specialize in idiosyncratic drug-induced hepatotoxicity.


- Users can search LiverTox with a drug name or drug class.
- LiverTox links out to other NLM resources with additional information, like PubMed and PubChem.
- Includes case studies for specific drugs.

## FOR YOUR LISTENING PLEASURE: PODCASTS




"At last"-I can hear Etta James singing in my headwe have the long-awaited results from the podcast survey that I conducted in the fall. This was a fun project that had, I admit, an ulterior motive: I was looking for suggestions for my own listening pleasure. The small handful of podcasts that I was listening to were suggestions provided by two of my colleagues at the University of Detroit-Mercy Dental Library, so I figured the general MDMLG community would probably have some great suggestions as well. And I was right. I want to thank those (n=33)who submitted responses. I had a great time combing through the results. Participants were not required to provide their names, although they could if they wanted. For those that did, I was fascinated to see where your interests lay.

#### **Results**

Q: Do you ever listen to podcasts? Twenty-nine participants indicated they have listened to podcasts while four stated they did not. Those that were not podcast listeners provided a few reasons why: podcasting is not a medium that worked for them; they have no interest in the format, along with a knowledge deficit regarding podcast technology and content; and the final comment indicated the respondent had "no need to".



Q: How many podcasts do you follow? The majority of participants (39%) indicated they follow from one to three podcasts, and an ambitious 12% (4) follow more than 15. The graph below shows the complete results.



Q: What do you like about listening to podcasts? Respondents (n=29) listed a variety of reasons why they enjoy podcasts. The following word cloud depicts the essence of the responses overall, along with the vagaries of word clouds (see "things").



## FOR YOUR LISTENING PLEASURE: PODCASTS (CONTINUED FROM PG. 9)

After a bit of light thematic analysis, ten themes emerged. The top four mentioned most frequently included, in descending order: distraction or entertainment while performing other tasks, education/information, nominal time investment, and interesting topics and subjects. The top reason, with 15 mentions, participants enjoy listening to podcasts is because they can "listen and learn while doing things that don't take up brain space," like driving, walking, and laundry. The next highest reason, with 11 mentions, was education and information. One participant wrote they like the differing topics along with "get[ting] informed" and "look[ing] at things in different points of view". Others mentioned they enjoyed listening to "deep dive discourse" on their topics of interest and gaining a better understanding of the celebrities as people. Nominal time investment received 5 mentions with respondents writing "the length of most podcasts (30-60 minutes) fits my available time", and "I'm not investing as much time as say listening to an audiobook". Finally, 3 participants enjoy podcasts because of the variety.

One wrote "listening to the radio doesn't allow for that kind of selection & control". Other reasons submitted included entertainment, free access, relaxing, immersive, and podcast host enthusiasm (e.g. "I enjoy the host's nerding out about music").

The most surprising result of this survey for me was confronting my preconceived notions about those who responded to the survey and MDMLG members themselves. I assumed, because I sent the survey link out on the MDMLG listserv, that all of the respondents would be medical/health sciences librarians. It occurs to me now that this may not be the case. I probably should have asked on the survey. Oh well. Secondly, I fully expected that the majority of those who responded would listen to medical podcasts for entertainment. In reality, very few do. I am a definite minority among this group in this regard. I have a nerdy fascination for medicine and medical history – but I have learned from this survey that this does not mean other medical librarians do. Many of you are probably more than happy to leave "work" behind as you walk out of the library or office.

As previously stated, I loved discovering my friends and colleagues' hobbies and interests. MDMLG is an eclectic bunch, as evidenced by the responses to the final question: What podcasts do you follow? Please list the titles, the genre or subject, and briefly, why you have chosen to listen (n=28). Not everyone supplied podcast names; some only listed genres. I used Apple Podcast's classifications when sorting the podcasts by subject. There were a few exceptions; video games got their own classification, separate from Apple's label of "Leisure". Additionally, if the podcasts were not available on Apple, I assigned my own subject classification.

A few participants apologized for their listening selections, supposing they would not be of interest to the MDMLG community. I disagree. As this survey shows, we have wide and varied interests. For example, one respondent included crime fiction podcasts along with a design and architecture podcast in their playlist.

The next page contains a table with a summary of the responses on our podcast habits, including the most common types/genres, how many of our members listen to the genre, and the most popular podcasts within that genre. A list of individual podcasts that our membership listens to will be shared in the next issue of the MDMLG Newsletter, so stay tuned!

## **HISTORY OF MDMLG**

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. It existed primarily as a social group until the mid-1950s when the members began to experiment with various projects. During the 1960s, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970.
