SHIFFMAN MEDICAL LIBRARY LAUNCHES DIVERSITY RESIDENCY PROGRAM

Wayne State University's Vera P. Shiffman Medical Library is thrilled to announce the introduction of a new three-year Library Residency position in Urban Health Research. The Residency in Urban Health Research Librarianship will provide two library professionals with the opportunity to gain expertise in biomedical library services while pursuing Medical Library Association certification in research data management, consumer health information management, or in-depth knowledge and skills in scholarly communications and publishing. The Residency's overarching purpose is to enhance the professional growth and development of underrepresented librarians

in academic research librarianship in a supportive, team environment.

Two dynamic, service-oriented, and team-oriented Urban Health Research Librarians (UHRL) will be selected to support the academic and clinical communities of Wayne State University School of Medicine and Eugene Applebaum College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences by providing in-depth biomedical information research support, course related in-



struction, information management responsibilities, and special projects. The roles will be fully integrated into the organizational structure of the Shiffman Medical Library, working with a team of librarians and professionals and reporting to the Library Director. Resident librarians will ultimately lead events, training, and projects to promote the discovery and implementation of library resources for urban health research.

Librarians will be guided through the landscape of medical librarianship, professional development planning, and scholarly activities, and will be encouraged to attend conferences and form professional networks with their peers in order to strengthen their competence and reputation in the field.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE IN HEALTH SCIENCE LIBRARIES: A SURVEY

By the time Open Al's ChatGPT entered the conversation in fall 2022, humanity had already been worrying about artificial intelligence for about 150 years. Samuel Butler's 1872 utopian satire *Erewhon* gives an early warning about the implications of machines developing con-



sciousness, an anxiety shared in fiction like 2001: A Space Odyssey, Phillip K. Dick books, or the new M3gan. Then there's works like Spielberg's A.I., Asimov's Robot series, or Pixar's Wall-E that present a slightly more hopeful view of artificial intelligence's influence on humanity. Yet after a century and a half of processing, the concept of artificial intelligence remains divisive, inspiring both hope and anxiety for the future.

Like most technology, it's double-edged: A.I. can help medical staff make quick clinical decisions, but it may also help a plagiarizing medical student fake it 'til they make it. Certain tasks can be completed with ease, so long as you don't mind another round of layoffs. So while society– particularly academia, healthcare, and publishing–adjusts to the brave new world, it felt like a good time to survey our membership to gauge our impressions of technology's latest innovation.

The results of the survey (n=13) show that we are still in the "early adoption" phase, at least in regards to generative A.I. Most responses indicated familiarity with (but a lack of experience using) the more popular tools that are now available. The impact of artificial intelligence on our day-today appears minimal so far, with fewer than half responding that it has not affected their work. Other respondents indicate that members of their institution have encountered A.I. and are developing guidelines or policy in response. At one local library, a document delivery librarian has received requests for articles that were created as real-world examples in a conversation with ChatGPT, but did not actually exist. The takeaway? Be wary, but not worried.

This was a fun project that had, I admit, an ulterior motive: I was looking for suggestions for my own listening pleasure. The small handful of podcasts that I was listening to were suggestions provided by two of my colleagues at the University of Detroit-Mercy Dental Library, so I figured the general MDMLG community would probably have some great suggestions as well. And I was right. I want to thank those (n=33) who submitted responses. I had a great time combing through the results. Participants were not required to provide their names, although they could if they wanted. For those that did, I was fascinated to see where your interests lay.



On the following pages are titles and description for the submitted podcasts. The brief descriptions have either been provided by the submitter or pulled from Apple Podcast. I have also included comments, if any were submitted by the participants who listed the podcast in their responses. If you are already a podcast consumer or a potential podcast consumer, I hope you find something to add to your playlist.

HISTORY OF MDMLG

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. It existed primarily as a social group until the mid-1950s when the members began to experiment with various projects. During the 1960s, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970.
