





Detroit abolitionists helped freedom seekers from the south evade slave catchers and local law enforcement on their way to Canada. Detroit's abolitionist community was fierce in its support of runaways in the face of severe local opposition."


to turn 5 months old. The rescue specializes in neonate care, bottle feeding, and orphaned animals and I've stayed in contact with her foster family so they know how she is doing.

MLA SPECIALIZATION NOW AVAILABLE TO WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

Congratulations to Wayne State University for having two health-focused courses certified to offer the **Medical Library Association's Consumer Health Information Specialization (CHIS)!**

Dr. Deborah Charbonneau, a Professor in the School of Information Sciences at Wayne State University, successfully prepared an application through the Network of the National Library of Medicine's (NNLM) Consumer Health for Library Students program. This initiative enables students to obtain a CHIS level II credential upon completing an approved course. Wayne State University is proud to be the first university in Michigan to offer this certification, setting a new standard for health information education.

Students can earn the CHIS certification, a nationally recognized credential certified by the Medical Library Association, by completing one or both approved courses: INF 7620 Health Informatics and INF 7610 Health Sciences Information Services and Resources. Dr. Charbonneau developed and teaches the INF 7620 Health Informatics course, demonstrating her expertise and commitment to advancing education in health informatics, a field that integrates information technology with healthcare to improve patient outcomes and healthcare delivery.

The INF 7610 course is currently taught by a part-time faculty member in the School, **Dr. Bethany Figg from Central Michigan University (CMU)**. Dr. Figg brings extensive experience to the INF 7610 course which she redesigned from previous years, developing an updated curriculum and original instructional materials. These enhancements support student engagement and the learning outcomes required by the CHIS certification. She holds the positions of Associate DIO, Director of Graduate Medical Education, and Assistant Professor in the College of Medicine at CMU.

In addition to equipping students for careers in healthcare, public health, and information science, the CHIS courses facilitate the development of essential competencies in comprehending health behaviors, enhancing digital health literacy, and advancing health equity. Wayne State University is actively promoting the courses across campus to underscore the importance of health information in building a healthier, more informed community.

RESOURCE ROUNDUP: A RECAP OF RECENT REVISIONS TO RX RESOURCES

PubMed Update: PubMed will soon reintroduce the ability to customize subject lines and body text when emailing search results or citations. With this update, the email feature will also require My NCBI login, and PubMed emails will only be sent to the email address associated with the My NCBI account.

PMC Beta Search Now Available: The National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI) is taking steps to modernize the <u>PubMed Central® (PMC)</u> website. The update transitions PMC search to a more modern search platform which provides users with more robust search functionality and accurate results including:

- Easy discovery of articles by searching on a title or basic citation data.
- Proximity searching on the full text.
- Targeted searches for terms and datasets in data availability statements.
- Updated searching with truncated terms and wildcards.
- A refined set of filters and search fields.

HISTORY OF MDMLG

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. It existed primarily as a social group until the mid-1950s when the members began to experiment with various projects. During the 1960s, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970.
